Curry Puffs Recipe by Liz Foster

This is a canape I learnt to make when we were living in Brunei. I usually make batches around Christmas to serve with drinks.



Ingredients

600 grams rolled puff pastry 1 egg, beaten 250 grams lean minced beef 1 large or 2 medium potatoes chopped very small

1-2 teaspoons medium curry powder Pinch of salt

Approx 7 fluid ounces water

Method

Put the beef, water, potatoes, curry powder and salt in a pan and bring to the boil. Then simmer until the water is absorbed and the potatoes are very soft. Leave to cool.

Roll out the puff pastry and cut out 4inch/10cm circles. Place a teaspoon of curry mix in each circle (do not overfill). Fold over and seal with water.



Place in a baking tray and brush with the beaten egg. Bake for 10-15 minutes at 200°C or until the puffs are light brown and crisp.

Serve warm or cold.

Remembrance Day Services & Poppy Appeal

On Sunday, 13th November a service was held in St Nicholas Church to remember those who fought and died for our freedom.



In particular we remember those who died in World War I: L/Cpl **Benjamin Hickson**, Leicestershire Regiment; Private **William Hickson**, 2/5th Durham Light Infantry; Private **Percy Charles Moreton**, 1/4th King's Shropshire Light Infantry; Gunner **Robert Henry Peacock**, Royal Field Artillery; Trooper **William Joseph Thraves**, 1/1st Staffordshire Yeomanry and Private **George Knott**, Bedfordshire Regiment.

Additionally Barry Swallow marched as a standard bearer for the Royal Air Force Association & Richard Foster, along with his grandchildren, went door to door in Stretton selling poppies and raised the brilliant sum of £334 for the Royal British Legion. This money helps the RBL with its welfare work for veterans, serving personnel and their families.

These celebrations were organised by a small, but hard-working committee, led by Sue Armstrong-Brookes.

By now, our small but beautiful church, St Nicholas, was falling into disrepair. The 'church roof' problems were causing issues inside. After years of water ingress the ceiling, walls and pews were damaged and the pew platforms becoming dangerous. Dwindling congregations (or more truthfully 'dwindled') could not keep up. St Nicholas was in danger of being closed. A committee led by Greg Harker took on the challenge of the first major refurbishment since 1881. Singlehandedly, Greg raised the £250,000.00 required by getting monies from numerous grant-giving organisations. Further information about this project can be found on www.stnicholasproject.co.uk.

We owe Greg a huge amount of thanks for the work he has done to safeguard our church for the future.

One condition associated with the majority of the monies raised, however, was that the church must be used for the good of the community in addition to being a place of worship. To meet this condition a Community Hub was proposed.

In 2022 the small, hard-working, Jubilee committee set up the Stretton, Rutland Community Hub Association (SRCHA) Although the SRCHA will be using the St Nicholas building for many of its activities, it is not a part of the Church organisation and is completely secular. The church is now referred to as 'the Hub' for activities organised by SRCHA. The purpose of the SRCHA is to:

- Bring the Community together
- Bring vitality and life to Stretton by holding events for all to take part
- Make it inclusive and especially appealing to our younger residents

History of The Ram Jam Inn

The Ram Jam started life as a coaching inn, The Winchelsea Arms in the 17th century and was reputed to be the haunt of Dick Turpin and other highwaymen.



By 1802 it became known as the Ram Jam Inn. The alleged story for the new name is that a coaching guest conned the lady of the house to ram and jam her thumbs into holes in a beer barrel whilst he then jumped on a waiting coach and left without making payment. From that day the Winchelsea Arms became known as the Ram Jam Inn.



The Inn's success as a coaching inn was due to its location; 97 miles from London, a half-way house between London and York. It was an AA and RAC appointed hotel on the Great North Road, the A1 as we know it today. It was one of the greatest coaching inns in England.

A fire in November 1988 caused extensive damage, and the Inn finally closed in August 2013. Its recent demolition makes way for the redevelopment of the site to form "Ram Jam Services" which will hopefully bring jobs, shops and interest back to the land that the Ram Jam Inn occupied – may its spirit of bringing hospitality to travellers linger on.

CHURCH VIEW

One of my favourite subjects at Christmas is one that's definitely not the most popular with other people. Whenever I share this very interesting slant on the nativity it usually gets a rather cool welcome because it shatters too many fondly held myths. Nevertheless, I think it makes a hugely important point about the nature of Christmas. So, read on, only if you are prepared for a seasonal spoiler!

We read in Luke's account of the birth of Jesus (Luke 2:7) that Mary, "wrapped Him in swaddling cloths, and placed Him in a manger, because there was no room for them in the inn." In our attempts to



paint a mental picture of the birth of Jesus, we latch onto two key words; manger and inn. We know that the heavily pregnant Mary and Joseph had just travelled to Bethlehem and were staying somewhere away from home, but there was no room in the *inn*. Where were they then? Well, wherever there might be a *manger* – that is, an animal feeder. It *must* be a stable or cattle shed! With just those two words, from *all* the accounts of the birth of Jesus, a whole sub-story has been imagined. And think about the implications of that: Mary and Joseph are strangers in an unfamiliar town, they are relegated to an outbuilding, they are alone. They seem to be ostracised and unwelcomed. Jesus is born into isolation, away from the people he's come to save.

But what gave me a different view was a diagram of a typical dwelling in first century Palestine, showing how they lived. It was a square, one storey building enclosing one main living space. The roof was invariably flat. An added luxury for some would have been a simple raised wooden platform that the family slept on. Why a luxury? Because the family would have also housed any livestock they owned *in that same space*. Maybe a cow for milk, maybe sheep or goats. What is also very important to understand is the *culture* of the time. There was a high value placed on welcome. Families would have always had somewhere to accommodate visiting relatives, or even just travellers. A guest space - sometimes referred to as the *upper room*. You can guess where that space often was — on the roof. Being the word for the place where travellers stayed, it was translated as *inn* in Luke's gospel.

So let's read and interpret that sentence again — with our greater understanding of Bethlehem homes. Mary wrapped baby Jesus in cloths and placed him in the hay basket, because there was no room for them in the guest space. Suddenly our imagined setting is completely changed. Because there was no room in the external guest space, Jesus was born inside, into the main living space. It wasn't a lonely and isolated birth for the son of God. Jesus was born into the centre of family. The story of Christmas is all about how the Son of God came to live with us, and what better place to start it than in the living room! Instead of the cool welcome that we can imagine for him, it was the warmest of welcomes for Jesus.

- Christmas Concert Saturday 10th December in the Hub


and we are working on other activities for the new year. Requests for activities were posted by various people attending the Cheese and Wine party and are being reviewed – one example was Table Tennis, already actioned! A Book Club in the early stages of being put together and also a Book Exchange!

We have also re-invented the old Stretton Village lottery into the newly launched Community Lottery.

Entries cost £5.00 per draw (£20.00 for the year) with 4 draws per year and the first prize is £100.00.

This is a great opportunity to support the Hub with hopefully some financial return!

In addition to activities for the community, the Hub is also available for hire. Stretton Parish Council now use the Hub for their meetings, which gives them and any attendees from the Parish much more room than they had previously.

The Shires School will be using the Hub for staff training.

The Hub is available for hire to locals for events such as children's parties, interest groups, exercise classes etc

The availability of the Hub as a space available for hire will be advertised shortly.

However, SRCHA is acutely aware that the Hub is a place of worship and will vet any applications to hire it accordingly.

The SRCHA committee has introduced a Membership Scheme - It is important to note that the Hub is 'Open To All' and Membership is not a requirement for any of the events and activities.

Taking a Membership option is a way of showing support for the SRCHA, but does come with benefits, e.g. discount on hiring the Hub and discount on SRCHA activities. Full details of Membership options can be found on www.strettonrutland.co.uk/chub-membership/

Although the aim of the Hub is to be a self-funding, non-profit making organisation, start-up costs have been high. This is due to both equipment needed for the Hub itself (churches tend to be a bit low on some of the essentials!) and for funding events (food, drinks etc).

Many of these costs have been met by the generosity of the committee members themselves.

So, at this initial stage, the SRCHA is looking for some start-up funding/donations to assist in buying necessities and organising events, and hope that the community of Stretton will help us in our endeavours.
